


How transparent are we?

- What about people with sight or hearing issues?



- Ethics refers to rules of personal conduct of a person or members of a profession.
- There are three aspects to ethics:
 - Discerning right from wrong
 - Committing to do what is right
 - Doing what is right

 - Teleological view(Mill)






Greater Good

Justice/Fairness/Equity




